

**Federal Government Spending in Minnesota:**  
*F. Y. 95 County-Area Profiles*

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## Introduction.

Federal spending in Minnesota during federal fiscal year 1995 is documented at the county-area level in the following set of tables. This analysis is based on data from the 1995 Consolidated Federal Funds Report, and represents only the federal share of any program spending.<sup>1</sup> Expenditures are listed for each county in a series of tables. Table 1 summarizes federal spending in seven broad categories. Table 2 focuses on the distribution of federal grants and other assistance. Table 2A completes an individualized accounting of federal grant activities in each county area. Table 3 details agricultural program payments within the county. Table 4 is a common table for all counties, and shows program spending that could not be allocated (for lack of geographic data) to the county-area level. Table 4 and some additional endnote tables are found in the back of this publication. Each table is described more fully below, along with brief definitions of the spending categories. A good source for further information on a particular government program is the 1995 Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance.<sup>2</sup> The numbers shown in parentheses in the program descriptions below are Federal Program Identification Numbers; Medicare for example is 93.773.

## Table 1 - F.Y.95 Federal Spending

Table 1 provides an overview of the federal presence in each county area by grouping expenditures in seven categories, starting with *Retirement and Disability* payments. County-area spending plus statewide total spending is shown for each category. However, not all of the \$18.973 billion in total federal spending could be allocated to the county-area level. This shared state spending or unallocated portion -- totaling \$1.978 billion -- is listed separately in Table 4. Next to the dollar amount of spending for each category of Table 1, is the percentage that category represents of the total allocated spending. For example, *Medicare* represented 15.6 percent of the (allocated) federal spending statewide. On a per-capita basis, Medicare spending averaged \$579 per person. The column of per capita differences (on the far right) is also shown graphically. A positive value here indicates that the county area received more federal dollars per person -- in that category -- than the statewide average.

Two additional pieces of information are provided in the lower left quadrant of Table 1. The shaded box contains the county's estimated 1994 total personal income.<sup>3</sup> This represents total household earnings in the county. The percent of income derived from federal spending is simply total federal spending countywide, divided by total county personal income. Some demographic highlights from the 1990 Census of Population and Housing appear below the personal income box.<sup>4</sup> Like the government programs detailed in this report, communities are dynamic and change over time. One way to measure this change is to compare the 1990 county population with the 1994 population; an estimate of the 1994 population is found in the table's upper right, beneath the county name.<sup>5</sup>

Retirement and Disabilities -- This category combines all of the direct payments to individuals for federal retirement and disability programs. Statewide totals for all retirement and disability programs are shown in Endnote Table E1.

Medicare -- (93.773) U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Health Care Financing Administration: fund's hospital insurance and supplemental medical insurance payments for the elderly and disabled. Part A provides hospital insurance for persons 65 and over, certain disabled persons, and individuals with chronic renal disease (kidney dialysis). Benefits are paid to hospitals, nursing homes, home health and hospice agencies. Persons under 65 who have been entitled for at least 24 months to Social Security disability benefits. Part B is a voluntary (for fee) medical insurance protection plan for persons 65 years and older, and those persons eligible for Medicare part A.

Medicaid -- (93.778) HHS, Health Care Financing Administration: cover's hospital insurance and supplemental medical insurance payments for low-income and needy persons. Provides financial assistance to states for payments of medical assistance on behalf of cash assistance recipients, children, pregnant women, and the aged who meet income and resource requirements.

Salaries and Wages is a combined category of federal employee compensation, including military, and is based on place of employment. Statewide department-level totals are provided in Endnote Table E2.

Procurement is a combined category of all agency procurement. This represents the value of awards to purchasing contracts, and is based on the place of performance. Statewide department-level totals are provided in Endnote Table E3.

Grants and Other Assistance includes all federal grants to local governments, and assistance to individuals for other than retirement and disabilities. This spending category is detailed in Tables 2 and 2A.

Agricultural Payments is the total amount of U.S. Department of Agriculture, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) program spending. These were in the form of payments to other than individuals. Table 3 reports individual program expenditures at the county-area level. Statewide program totals are provided in Endnotes Table E4.

**Table 2 - F.Y.95 Grants and Other Assistance**

Federal grants to local governments, other entities, such as non-profits, and direct assistance to individuals --other than for retirement and disabilities-- are detailed in Table 2 . Note that the total county area spending at the top of table 2 matches the table 1 category spending for Grants and Other Assistance. Table 2 covers spending for 22 program areas, beginning with Highway Planning and Construction grants. Not all counties receive federal support in all the programs listed in table 2. Where category spending is blank, the county area had no federal spending reported. Program benefits may still be available in the county, however, such as Head Start where the program is administered through a regional authority. Category spending may also occasionally be negative. This can occur when spending is de-authorized, for example, from an over-funded capital project. The last item in Table 2 is the category *All Other Assistance*. This "remainder" category is detailed further in Table 2A.

Low-Income Energy Assistance - (93.568) HHS, Administration For Children And Families: provides block grants to states to assist eligible households meet the cost of home energy. Weatherization assistance program is included in table 4.

Social Service Block Grants - aka Title XX (93.667) HHS, Administration For Children And Families: block grants for the proper and efficient operation of social service programs. To prevent, reduce, or eliminate dependency; prevent neglect, abuse, or exploitation of children and adults; prevent or reduce inappropriate institutional care. A wide range of program activities is eligible for funding.

Head Start - (93.600) HHS, Administration For Children And Families: project grants for comprehensive health, educational, nutritional, social and other services to economically disadvantaged preschool children. Ten percent of children must be disabled.

Community Development Block Grants - (14.218) HUD, Community Planning And Development: formula grant to develop viable urban communities, by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment, and by expanding economic opportunities, principally for persons of low and moderate incomes. For cities over 50,000 persons. Table 4 has additional related funding.

Handicapped -- Education State Grants - (84.027) DOE, Special Education And Rehabilitation: formula grants to school districts for the free and appropriate education of all children with disabilities; including mental retardation, and hearing, speech, visual, or emotionally impairment.

Postal Service - Non-Wage/Non-Procurement - U.S. Postal Service spending includes the cost of hiring bulk carriers, vehicle maintenance expense, the cost of new employee physical exams, and the medical expenses from dog bite injuries.

Child Support Enforcement - (93.563) HHS, Administration For Children And Families: enforces support obligations owed by absent parents their children, helps locate absent parents, establish paternity, and obtain child, spousal and medical support. Also see Table 4 for additional related spending.

Rural Rental Assistance - (10.427) USDA, Rural Housing And Community Development Services: direct payment to reduce the tenant contribution paid by low-income families, senior citizens, or handicapped persons where the rent exceeds 30 percent of their monthly income.

All Volunteer Educational Assistance - aka Montgomery GI Bill (64.124) VA, Veterans Benefits Administration: direct payments to help servicepersons readjust to civilian life and gain an education, also to recruit and retain highly qualified armed forces' personnel. Requires a reduction in active duty pay for educational benefits after service.

Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants - (84.007) DOE, Postsecondary Education: direct assistance grants to students with demonstrated need, for undergraduate studies. Funds are allocated to institutions and requires institutional match.

College Work Study - (84.033) DOE, Postsecondary Education: direct payment to (financially needy) college students for part-time employment to help meet educational expenses and encourage community service activities. Requires institutional or employer matching contribution.

Category Descriptions. (*Federal Program Identification Numbers are shown in parenthesis.*)

Highway Planning And Construction - (20.205) Department of Transportation (DOT), Federal Highway Administration: assists States in developing an integrated, interconnected transportation system, including engineering, construction, re-construction, and a wide range of other uses. These are reported by place of performance; i.e., where the funded project is located. If place of performance is more than one county, each county's share will be reported.

Research Grants -- This category represents a collection of research programs funded by departments and agencies such as the National Institutes of Health, and Department of Defense. County areas most directly impacted by this spending category, as measured in terms of percentage of total grant activity, are Hennepin, Olmsted, and Rice.

Low Income Housing Assistance -- aka Section 8 *Moderate Rehabilitation* (14.856) Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), Public And Indian Housing: provides direct payment to participating owners on behalf of eligible *very low income* tenants to provide decent, safe, and sanitary housing. This program makes up the difference between an approved rent and the occupant's designated portion of rent.

Family Support Assistance Payments - aka AFDC (93.560) Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Administration For Children And Families: provides funding to states for direct cash payments to eligible needy families with dependent children for food, shelter, clothing, and other daily needs.

Food Stamps - (10.551) U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), Food And Consumer Services: direct payments (based on household size and income) to improve diets of low-income households by increasing their food purchasing ability. Low-income elderly and handicapped persons are also eligible. Does not include state administration grant, see table 4.

Public And Indian Housing - (14.850) HUD, Public And Indian Housing: direct payments to public (and Indian) housing authorities to provide and operate cost-effective, decent, safe and affordable dwellings for *lower* income families - including individuals; age 62 or older, disabled, handicapped, or remaining members of a tenant family.

Pell Grants - (84.063) U.S. Department of Education (DOE), Office Of Postsecondary Education: direct grant assistance to meet educational expenses of financially needy *undergraduate* college students. These grants are attributed to the county in which the educational institution is located.

Educationally Deprived Children - aka Title I (84.010) DOE, Office Of Elementary And Secondary Education: provides grant funds for supplemental services in regular school programs. Purpose is to improve the educational opportunities of educationally deprived children. State administration grant not included, see table 4.

National School Lunch Program - (10.555) USDA, Food And Consumer Services: formula grant of cash and (donated) commodities to assist states make lunch available to all students where the program is operating, free or at a reduced price. Includes schools, daycare, foster care, camps, and other institution.

Rural Water & Waste Disposal - (10.76) USDA, Rural Utility Services makes project grants (also has direct or guaranteed loans) to provide basic human amenities, alleviate health hazards, and promote the orderly growth of rural areas by meeting the need for new and improved rural water and waste disposal facilities. Service-area population cannot be in excess of 10,000 persons.

Certification Of Health Providers And Suppliers - (93.777) HHS, Health Care Financing Administration provides financial assistance to states to determine that providers and suppliers of health care services are in compliance with federal regulations and Medicare and Medicaid participation requirements.

All Other Spending - remaining grants and other assistance spending. Table 2A provides a complete detailing for each county.

**Table 2A.**

This table provides a list of programs unique to each county, and explains the "All Other Spending" category at the bottom of Table 2. Spending for most counties can be covered in a one-page list, but with some counties, like Ramsey and Hennepin, the list runs to several pages. Again, a good source for details about the programs in Table 2A, is the 1995 Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance.

**Table 3 - F.Y.95 Agricultural Payments.**

County-level spending for U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) programs are reported in Table 3. Only those programs active in the county area are listed. A summary of statewide spending for all ASCS programs is included in Table E4. Crop insurance is unallocated at the county level, but can be found in Table 4. The exhibit in the lower right quadrant of Table 3 shows two other pieces of agriculturally related information. Total salaries and wages for all USDA programs in the county. Below that, is the total of all USDA procurement, including dairy program purchases, which for a few counties may be substantial. Three types of government loans to agriculture are also listed in this exhibit. These values do not represent expenditures, but the dollar volume of loan activities. Finally, in the lower left quadrant of Table 3 are some highlights from the 1992 Census of Agriculture.<sup>6</sup> Readers of Table 3 should bear in mind the highly variable nature of agriculture on a year-to-year basis, both in terms of farm income and federal program support.

In the back of this publication are the following tables - be sure to copy these along with individual county profiles.

**Table 4 - F.Y.95 Spending Shared Statewide**

This table lists programs that are either administered by the state, or lack geographic identifiers necessary to allocate the spending to a county-area level. Total unallocated, or shared spending, is \$1.978 billion. In the back of this publication are two versions of Table 4. The 10-page

version lists all of the program spending not allocated to the county-area level. An abridged 2-page version has less detail, but is easier to copy for distribution or discussion. Note that the first four programs on either list account for more than half of the unallocated spending.

**Endnotes Table E1 - Retirement and Disability payments.**

Table E1 disaggregates total statewide spending for federal retirement and disability payments into the individual programs. Social security retirement insurance accounts for more than half of the category's total spending. As a brief reminder: Social Security Retirement Insurance provides monthly cash benefits for retired workers age 62 and over, and their auxiliaries. Social Security Survivors Insurance acts to replace part of earnings lost to dependents because of a worker's death. Social Security Disability Insurance is for workers under the age of 65, to replace part of the earnings lost because of a physical or mental impairment severe enough to prevent a person from working. Finally, Supplemental Security Income is payments for persons 65 and over, or who are blind or disabled, to assure a minimum level of income to persons whose income and resources are below specified levels.

**Endnotes Table E2 - Salary and Wages.**

Thirty-six federal departments or agencies had salary and wage expenditures in Minnesota during fiscal year 1995. Half the \$1.648 billion in spending was for the U.S. Postal Service. Not included in salaries and wages are the employer's share of life and health insurance premiums (\$116 million). See line four of Table 4.

**Endnotes Table E3 - Procurement - value of purchases.**

Federal procurement spending represents the value of awards to purchasing contracts and is based on the place of performance. Table 1 shows the combination of all federal procurement spending in the county. Table E3 shows the total purchases made in the state, but breaks spending down by Department or Agency. The Department of Defense accounted for two-thirds of all federal procurement in Minnesota, having made \$1.109 billion in purchases during F.Y.95.

**Endnotes Table E4 - Agricultural Program Payments.**

County-area agricultural program spending is detailed in Table 3. Table E4 gives total USDA, ASCS program spending statewide. Since the federal fiscal year began October 1, 1994, these program expenses reflect the summer of 1994 crop season. This spending also represents the last year under the 1990 Farm Bill and its associated programs.

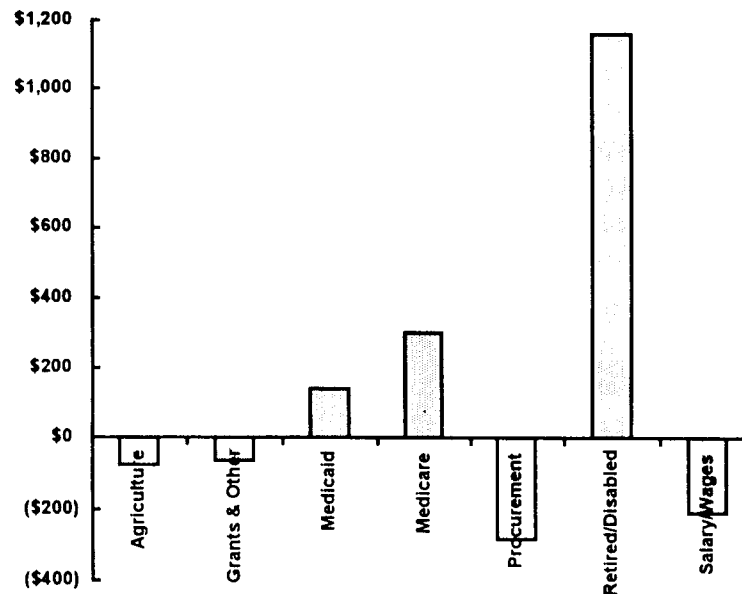

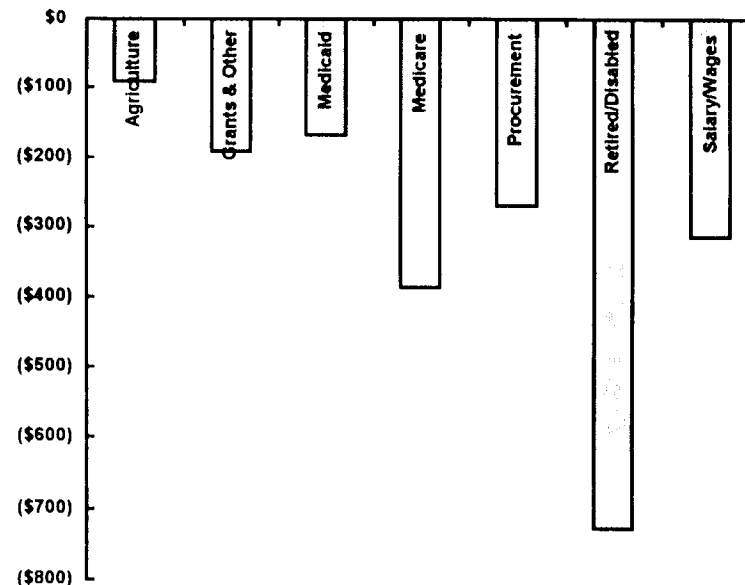
